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HISTORY OF THE USS BLUE RIDGE

FEBRUARY 27, 1967 A flagship was born. Its keel was laid at the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard. Here, for the first time is a platform built from the keel up to accomplish the mission of command and control coordination.

NOVEMBER 14, 1970 USS Blue Ridge christened as a warship at the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard.

APRIL 9, 1971 Blue Ridge arrives in homeport San Diego, her home for the next 8 years.

JULY 17. 1979 Blue Ridge is moored at its new forward-deployed port in Yokosuka, Japan

AUGUST 1990- APRIL1991

During Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm, Blue Ridge served as flagship for Commander, United States Naval Forces Central Command. The 9-and-a-half month deployment earned the ship a Navy Unit Commendation Medal. JULY 2, 1979 Blue Ridge leaves for Yokosuka, Japan

> DCTDBER, 1979 Blue Ridge becomes the permanent flagship of Commander, 7th Fleet.

THROUGH THE YEARS

Blue Ridge has earned nine Battle Efficiency "E" Awards, and in 2010 and 2011 earned the Captain Edward F. Ney Award for best food service for large deck ship in the fleet.

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The Blue Ridge Mission

USS Blue Ridge (LCC 19) represents a unique achievement in the Navy's command and control ship design and represents the accumulated knowledge of over five decades of the Navy's experience in control and coordination.

Blue Ridge uses computers, communications equipment and other electronic facilities to fulfill her mission as command ship for the United States 7th Fleet. Her secondary function is command ship for the Amphibious Task Force and Landing Force commanders during fleetwide operations, as well as a Commander, Joint Task Force (CJTF) flagship when national interests require.

Blue Ridge is the most capable command ship ever built. The Global Command and Control System (Maritime) consists of high-powered computers throughout the ship from which information and data from world-wide sources are entered into a central database.

This integrated database concentrates the available information into a complete tactical picture of air, surface and subsurface contacts, enabling the fleet commander to quickly assess any situation. With state of the art commercial and military satellite capability, coupled with the ability to track land, sea, and air movements throughout the region, Blue Ridge is among the most technologically advanced ships in the world.

Blue Ridge is a great improvement in ship design, not only in speed, but also in habitability. Fitness rooms, air conditioning, ship's stores, spacious galley and messing areas all make life at sea pleasant for the crew and embarked staff. Blue Ridge has accommodations for over 250 officers, 1,050 enlisted men and 150 enlisted females.

The ship is slated to remain in Yokosuka until 2039, more than 29 years beyond her originally estimated decommissioning date.

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BOARDING THE SHIP



STEP ONE

Walk up the brow and stop just before stepping aboard. Face the aft end of the ship and salute the ensign. If you are not in uniform, stand at attention facing the aft end of the ship for a second. Although it may not be visible, the ensign flies at the aft end of the ship between 0800 and sunset.

STEP TWO

Step off the brow and approach the Watch. Face the Watch, holding your military ID in your left hand where the Watch can see it. If in uniform, salute the Watch and request permission to come aboard. If you are not in uniform, stand at attention and request permission to come aboard.

STEP THREE

The Watch will return your salute and/or grant you permission to come aboard. You may now move about the ship freely. Be sure to leave the quarterdeck promptly to help keep traffic flowing.

NOTE

If it is before 0800 and after sunset/evening colors, you do not salute the ensign before approaching the Watch. If you are in civilian clothes, you are still required to render honors to the ensign by standing at attention.

TO DEPART THE SHIP

follow the same steps for boarding in reverse. Approach the Watch with your military ID and request permission to go ashore (enlisted), or inform the Watch that you have permission to go ashore (officers). The Watch will return your salute and grant permission to go ashore (enlisted) or acknowledge that you are going ashore (officers).

Before crossing the brow, salute the ensign and depart the ship. Just like with boarding the ship, only salute the ensign after 0800 and before evening colors.

If you are in civilian clothes render honors by standing at attention.



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NAVIGATING INSIDE THE SHIP

The Blue Ridge is a large ship, and an easy place to get lost. For the unfamiliar, passageways quickly begin to look alike. An easy way to find out where you are and figure out where to go is by using the ship's bullseyes. Bullseyes can be found on bulkheads opposite entryways.

Deck or Level Number

The vertical location of a space in regards to the main deck, "1". the next level down is "2" and so on. We call these "decks." Above the main deck are "Levels." Levels go from one story above the main deck, "DI," to the highest point on the ship.

Frame Number

A frame is a steel wall or beam running across the breadth of the ship. They are approximately 4 feet apart and are numbered forward to aft from 0 to 140, with the bow at 0 and the stern at 140.

Port or Starboard

The third set of numbers in this set of coordinates signals this space's position relative to the center line. Odd numbers represent the starboard side and even numbers represent port. The further away from the centerline you go, the higher the numbers.


Space Use

Spaces are assigned a letter based on their use. "Q" is used for offices; other examples include:

"A" - Dry Storage "C" - Control Spaces "L" - Living Spaces "M" - Ammunition "T" - Vertical Access

SHIP SAFETY

USS Blue Ridge is a warship and contains many **unexpected hazards**. To ensure your safety please follow these guidelines:

Watch your step:

Step **over** knee-knockers (dividers in between passageways) in the passageways, not on them. Always take your time going up and down ladders (stairs) and hold on to the handrails. Dur ladderwells are steeper than most civilian staircases and may be slippery at times.

DO NOT PUSH ANY BUTTONS, PULL ANY PINS OR TURN ANY WHEELS!

Stay out of restricted areas:

Stay away from areas that are posted as unauthorized.

Watch out when closing doors and hatches:

Open and close hatches without putting your hands, fingers and legs in harm's way.

When wearing personal music players, on the ship, keep one ear bud out to be informed of emergencies or announcements.

Going Out onto the Flight Deck:

NO COVERS outside the skin of the ship when the ship is in flight quarters.

The main deck is SECURED for all non-essential foot traffic during flight operations.

Only QUALIFIED or ESSENTIAL personnel are allowed on the flight during flight operations.

ALWAYS wear proper flight deck gear when going out on the flight deck.

FOREIGN OBJECT DAMAGE (FOD) awareness: FOD prevention is an ALL HANDS program. FOD (of any type) should never be introduced to the flight deck or hangar bay. Maintain accountability of your tools, parts, personal items, etc.

NO LOOSE OBJECTS, including ballcaps, on your person when on the flight deck. Loose objects create a FOD hazard.

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
BASIC SHIPBOARD INFORMATION

LEARN YOUR DESIGNATED MUSTERING LOCATIONS BEFORE AN EMERGENCY!

If **GENERAL QUARTERS (GQ)** is sounded, immediately make way to your mustering location in the most direct manner and remain there until GQ is finished. DO NOT BREAK "ZEBRA" BOUNDARIES FOR ANY REASON OTHER THAN AN EMERGENCY. Make way for responders!

For MAN OVERBOARD, muster at your division's designated location for accountability as fast as possible. Report accountability to the PILOT HOUSE within 8 minutes.

For **ABANDON SHIP**, muster at your designated life raft with your cover, flash gear, and portable life preserver. In the event your life raft is missing, you will be assigned a new one by DECK DEPARTMENT.



LISTEN to all IMC announcements (they are important and may apply to you!)

Transitioning through OFFICER, CPD, BERTHING, and STAFF country spaces should be limited to official business only.

Only smoke in DESIGNATED AREAS. Vaping is NOT AUTHORIZED on a ship. Only spit in containers with a lid that closes, labeled with your name.

Check in with the Post Office, (4-91-2-0) to receive your PO Box Number. Divisional Mail Orderlies will pickup mail daily, only registered Mail Orderlies can pickup mail from the Post Office.



SAPR REPRESENTATIVE OSC KIDDY

The Sexual Assault Prevention and Response (SAPR) Program's primary goals are to prevent sexual assault from happening and to support victims when an assault is reported. The SAPR program services are confidential and available 24/7. Victim Advocates are carefully selected, trained and credentialed military and DoD civilian personnel who provide support and assistance to victims of sexual assault. They are directly supervised by the Sexual Assault Response Coordinator and are required to maintain confidentiality of victim communication.

The DAPA reports to the Executive Officer, regarding assigned duties and all drug and alcohol abuse prevention, control, and enforcement programs.
